

A fun and easy sewing pattern by Michelle Goggins

Supplies needed:

1 strip of white fabric 2 X 11 inches

1 strip of orange fabric 3 X 11 inches

1 strip of yellow fabric 2 X 11 inches

1 strip of one-sided fusible fleece 5 ½ X 11 inches


Thread

Black pearl crown rayon embroidery floss

2 white buttons (1/2-inch diameter)

2 black buttons (3/8-inch diameter)

Stuffing



All seam allowances are ¼ inch throughout the pattern.

How to sew:



Sew the yellow strip to the orange strip along the 11 inch side with right sides together.


Press the seam allowance toward the orange fabric.



Sew the white strip to the orange strip along the 11 inch side with right sides together.

Again, press the seam allowance toward the orange fabric.








Fuse the one-sided fusible fleece to the wrong side of the sewn fabric strip.



Place the strip right side up. The white fabric will be the top, while the yellow fabric will be the bottom.






Place the pattern pieces, aligning the colors on the pattern with the colors of the fabric, and cut them out. You will have one front piece and one back piece.





Cut out the eyes and mouth on the front pattern piece.

Use this as a template to mark the eyes and mouth onto one of the fabric pieces with a removable fabric pencil.





Embroider the mouth using a basic back stitch. (See page 7 for instructions.)




Sew on the eyes. Start by sewing on the white button with a couple of stitches, then place the black button on top and sew it through the holes of the white button.



Note: You can make the eyes however you like! You could just use one button, use googly eyes, sew embroidery eyes, or use a permanent fabric marker.



Place the candy corn front and back pieces with right sides together. Sew around the outer edge, leaving a 2 inch opening at the bottom for turning.





Clip the curves





Turn the candy corn right side out.



Fill with stuffing.



Sew the bottom closed with a ladder stitch. (See page 7 for instructions.)



Enjoy your happy little candy corn!








Hand-sewing instructions How to embroider the basic back stitch:


1. Thread the needle and tie a knot in one end. Bring the needle up from the wrong side of the fabric at point A on your marked line.



2. Bring the needle back down through point B, which is at the beginning of the marked line.



3. Bring the needle back up through point C.



Hand-sewing a ladder stitch:

Thread a needle and tie a knot in one end.


Bring the needle up from the wrong side of the fabric at #1. Go back down through the fabric at #2.

Come back up at #3, back down through #4, etc.


The dashed lines in the illustration indicate that the thread is on the wrong side of the fabric.


When the gap is closed, pull the stitches tight and tie a knot.

4. Bring the needle back down through point A. You'll want to catch a couple of threads from the first stitch in the needle.




5. Bring the needle up through point D. Continue in the same manner until the marked line is completed. Tie a knot.
